Dear Parents/Carers

Welcome to the 2025/26 academic year. It has been a lovely start with our new Year 7s settling in very well. I will start the year telling you a bit more about the end of term and the summer.



A Level results came in mid-August and we had a lovely results morning where we wished good luck to our leaving Year 13s, telling them we hoped their next steps in life would bring happiness and success. In the picture Connie, on the left, is off to King's College to study Music, Emma and Emma to the University of Kent to study History and Sociology. Every Year 13 that wanted to go to university had an acceptance on the day, almost all straight away in the morning, it was an unusually fast results day with everything done and dusted after an hour.





This was followed a week later by GCSE results which was another happy morning where our students found out their grades and made their plans for Post 16 study. We again were able to say well done, and good luck, to all for getting to this point in life, leaving mainstream school, setting out on their next steps in education and then employment. As a year group 78% of them got Grade 4+ in Maths and English, which is called the Basics measure and the equivalent of the old C grade. This was higher than last year and we are very proud of them for doing so well, the England average was 67%.

Escaped Bird of Prey

We had some drama over the weekend at the start of term when an escaped bird of prey from an aviary chased a pigeon into the anti-pigeon netting on one of our buildings. We need the netting as large numbers of pigeons were gathering and creating sanitary issues with their mess around the school eating and sitting areas. The bird of prey was then seen by members of the village in our netting and rescued by a local bird of prey expert. It has now been reunited with its owner.

Vaping and Energy Drinks

I noticed this BBC article on the dangers of vaping for teenagers and in particular noted that 25% of vapes confiscated from children when tested for drugs were found to contain them, often without the child knowing. We do not currently have a particular problem with vaping in school; it did become a bit of an issue after the return from COVID but has very much calmed down over the last two years. The government is considering banning them for under 16s in England, and already, many shops don't sell them to under 16s. If you read the back of an energy drink they say 'not suitable for children, pregnant women or sensitive people.' This is because they are high in sugar and caffeine, with one small energy drink being the same as drinking three cans of full sugar and caffeine coca cola. Energy drinks are not allowed in school and will always be confiscated, for all students and 6th formers. I have over time had conversations with students who thought an energy drink was a breakfast replacement, and even whose parents had given it to them as such. It really is not a good idea to give a growing child or teenager an energy drink.

Council preparing draft Local Plan for Consultation

Ashford Borough Council is preparing a new Local Plan for the borough and is inviting local communities to get involved in the process. See here for further details on how to 'Have your Say'.

The council will be consulting on a draft version of the Plan, known as a Regulation 18, for eight weeks from Monday 18 August to Monday 13 October 2025. The consultation will be live on the council's website on 18 August, and a series of public events are planned for September and October.

A Local Plan provides the opportunity to shape the places that we live, work and socialise. It addresses housing and employment needs and provides a series of planning policies covering many other topics such as community facilities and infrastructure, the natural and historic environment, adapting to climate change and achieving well designed places. Although the general principle of the plan is to encourage growth within the economy of Ashford and plan housing delivery, our Local Plan will also seek to protect Ashford's valued assets including our landscapes, heritage, and open spaces for leisure and nature.

Once adopted, the policies within a Local Plan are used as the starting point to decide planning applications for future development.

This consultation is the first formal consultation stage of the plan-making process and follows a series of community engagement events held last year entitled 'Our Local Plan Explained'. These events were held to engage the community at the earliest stage of the process so that the community could find out what the Local Plan is, how to get involved and to understand the plan-making process.

Cllr Linda Harman, Portfolio Holder for Planning, Housing Delivery & Communications said: "This draft Local Plan sets out the Council's direction of travel on a number of key planning matters. This first formal stage of the Local Plan process seeks residents' views. Everyone is affected by planning so it's important that we give residents and organisations an opportunity to have their say and to help shape our emerging Local Plan. I very much hope that people will engage in the process. By working together with residents and other stakeholders we can ensure that development is appropriate and delivers the affordable homes and infrastructure that our borough needs."
