#### **Dear Parents/Carers**

## Reports and Set Changes for Years 7-10

Students in Years 7 to 10 will be receiving their first academic and engagement report before the half term. These reports are a great opportunity to speak with your child about their current progress in each subject as well as their engagement with their learning. In order to ensure students are given the most appropriate support, we will be using a combination of their assessment results and their classwork, to review the set that each student is in for Maths, English and Science (so one test score alone does not decide a set change). These will be able to be seen on the Arbor portal over the half term. Students in years 7-10 will all receive a new timetable during tutor time on the first day back after the break.

# How You Can Support Your Child at Home

#### Homework

One of the most important things that you can do to support your child is encourage and support them to complete their homework. If possible, please provide a quiet space for them to do their homework. Homework is published on <a href="here">Arbor</a> so that students and parents/carers are able to see what is set and when it is due. For external exam years we also put on lunchtime and holiday revision sessions, these are emailed to parents of the respective years as they are arranged.

## Spotlight on Speech and Language

# **Understanding Stammering: A Guide for Parents Understanding Speech and Language Disorders**

Speech and language disorders can significantly impact a child's ability to communicate effectively. These disorders are relatively common, affecting about one in 12 children. Early identification and intervention are crucial for helping children develop the necessary skills to communicate and interact with others, our focus this term is Stammering.

What is Stammering? Stammering, also known as stuttering, is a speech disorder where the flow of speech is interrupted by repetitions, prolongations, or blocks of sounds, syllables, or words. It typically emerges between the ages of 2 and 5 and can vary greatly in severity and presentation.

By understanding stammering and taking proactive steps, parents can help their children develop strategies to support them and develop strong communication skills.

#### Reading and encouraging a love of reading

We are excited to share our ongoing efforts to foster a love of reading among our students. Reading is a fundamental skill that allows students to access all areas of the curriculum and supports students in their creativity, communication skills and emotional development. To support reading, we have implemented **reciprocal reading strategies** during tutor-guided reading sessions.

#### Reciprocal Reading Strategies involve four key components:

- 1. **Predicting**: Students make predictions about the text before reading.
- 2. Clarifying: They identify and clarify unfamiliar words or concepts.
- 3. Questioning: Students generate questions about the text to deepen understanding.
- 4. **Summarising**: They summarise the main ideas after reading.

These strategies not only enhance comprehension but also encourage active engagement with the text. During tutor-guided reading time, tutors model these strategies and guide students through the process, helping them become more confident and independent readers.

#### **Supporting Reading at Home**

We thank you for all your support with reading with your child at home. We encourage you to use these reciprocal reading strategies at home to support your child's reading development.

By incorporating these strategies into your reading routine, you can help reinforce the skills your child is learning at school and make reading a more interactive and enjoyable experience.

## **Reading Ages in Mid-Year Reports**

We would also like to inform you that reading ages will be included in the mid-year reports. This will provide you with valuable insight into your child's reading progress and areas for improvement. Interventions are put in place for any students that may need additional support with their reading. If your child requires any level of intervention for their reading, parents and guardians will be notified.

# UK Maths Trust

Congratulations to many of our amazing year 10 and year 11 mathematicians who have received silver and bronze certificates in this year's UKMT Intermediate Maths Challenge.

Around 60 students from Year 10 and 11 participated this year with pencil, paper and fantastic problemsolving skills which has resulted in 15 Wye students achieving either bronze, silver or gold at the Intermediate level.

The UKMT Individual Maths Challenges are intriguing and puzzling multiple choice question papers, which are designed to stimulate interest in Maths in large numbers of pupils. The Intermediate maths challenge took place on Wednesday, 29 January with our most talented maths students in year 10 and 11 entering. Nationally over 600 000 students enter the competition and can receive either a bronze, silver or gold achievement with the very best students progressing through to the next round. Well done to the silver and bronze certificate achievers.
