Parental Awareness - Gauth App

It has been brought to our attention that some students have started using the Gauth app to complete homework. This AI tool provides answers rather than encouraging students to think through problems themselves. At Wye, we value homework because it reinforces learning beyond the classroom, builds independence and resilience, and helps teachers identify where support is needed. We kindly ask parents to check that their child is completing homework independently and to discuss the purpose of homework with them. Simple strategies such as setting a quiet space, agreeing on a regular homework routine, and praising effort rather than speed can make a big difference. Thank you for working with us to help your child develop the skills they need for success working on their ambition and determination.

Achievement Award - New for 2025-2026

This academic year, we've introduced the Achievement Award as part of our end-of-term celebrations. Each year group will have one boy and one girl selected for demonstrating an outstanding attitude toward learning and their peers. Our Student Support Assistants will choose the winners for each year group. The Achievement Award recognises students who have shown exceptional effort in their studies, represented the school positively, displayed kindness toward others, or taken the lead in extracurricular activities.

Term 3 - Sports Round up



TWO HUNDRED UP!

This term saw our 200th student represent the school in one of our sports teams or at a sports event. The current number stands at 214 students from Years 7-11 who have played in sports teams across over 70 fixtures and events in Football, Rugby, Netball, Badminton, Cross Country, Gladiators, and Indoor Cricket since the start of the academic year in September. As a small school we are extremely proud of the sport provision we offer, which ultimately is made possible because of the enthusiasm shown by our students who represent us with pride, upholding our school values when taking to the field of play. Well done and thank you to all of the students who have contributed to a fantastic two terms of sport, and also to the staff who give up their time to run teams and training beyond the hours of the school day.

Football

Year 9 won 2-0 at Turner School in November to become Champions of the Ashford and Shepway Division 2 District Football league, finishing the season with a 100% record, winning all of their league matches. Highlights have included a 7-1 victory at Brockhill, a 6-1 win over Chilmington Green, and a hard fought 1-0 result earlier this term at Folkestone Academy. Every single player has contributed to a thoroughly enjoyable two terms of football and shown great character and togetherness. Well done to all of the players involved for their efforts this season.

There were also some positive reults for our younger teams. Year 7 finished the season strong, winning their final two matches of the season. Top goal scorer Keissan was on target in wins against Harvey Grammar School (2-1) and Turner School (3-1). Year 8 also managed their first win of the season in brisk conditions at Folkestone Academy with goals from Iiriano and Theo securing a 2-1 scoreline.





Indoor Cricket

In the final week of term Wye and Chilmington Green played the first ever 'UL Ashes' at the brand new Chilmington Green site. Each school fielded an U14 team featuring players from Years 7, 8 & 9 with Wye coming out on top after setting Chilmington a target of 146 runs. Well done to the players involved for working hard to



improve their skills during lunchtime training with Mr Pryse this term.

Swimming

Back in October half term Sophie (Y8) and Mia (Y9) travelled to Salou Spain with Ashford Town Swimming Club to train at the Sylvia Fontana Swimming Pool, a 50 meter outdoor pool previously used at the Olympics. They completed four hours of training in the pool each day as well as completing land based training. Sophie and Mia were two of five girls selected as part of a nineteen strong squad and both had a fantastic experience. The girls are now aiming to reach County standard times this year and will represent Wye School in the Kent Schools Championships in January.



Badminton

Our Badminton teams were in action in December as the U13 girls hosted North for some friendly action and our U15 girls travelled in the opposite direction to play in a ten pair tournament. Well done to all who took part and a special mention to Year 10 girls Eva and Anna Rose who played extremely well to reach the final.

Rugby

Mr Wickington's rugby squads took part in a triple header of development matches with Simon Langton at the end of November. This was an invaluable experience for all of our players against strong Langton opposition. The U13 squad managed an impressive 3-2 win and the U14s and U15s gained important game time as they head towards a busier playing schedule after Christmas.



Netball

Year 7 claimed their first every victory this season with an excellent 4-0 result against Chilmington Green earlier this month. Throughout the game there was solid defending from Mia, Lucia and Dolly and Indie showed wonderful tenacity at Centre. There was also important attacking play from Beatrice and Jessie, and superb shooting from Bluebelle who was 'Star Player'.

Up next...

Term 3 will see the girl's District School's Football leagues get under way and we are looking forward to seeing our U13 and U15 girls in action. There will also be boys and girls teams playing in the District Basketball leagues, as well as continuing Netball and Rugby action across all years.

Spotlight on Speech and Language - Understanding Language Delay

Language is the foundation for learning, social interaction, and emotional development. While most students develop language skills naturally, some experience language delay which can significantly impact their academic progress and confidence.

What is Language Delay?

Language delay refers to difficulties in understanding or using spoken language compared to peers of the same age. It's not about intelligence—students with language delay often have normal cognitive abilities—but they may struggle with vocabulary, sentence structure, or comprehension. Signs to look out for would be, difficulty following instructions or understanding classroom discussions. A Limited vocabulary or trouble finding the right words. Short, simple sentences when speaking or writing. Challenges with reading comprehension and written tasks. Avoidance of group work or verbal participation.

Why Does It Matter? - Language skills underpin every subject. Students with language delay may: Misinterpret questions or tasks, fall behind in literacy and subject-specific vocabulary, experience frustration, anxiety, or social isolation.

How Can We Support Them? - Use clear, simple instructions and check understanding, Pre-teach key vocabulary before lessons, provide extra processing time for responses, foster a supportive environment where students feel safe to ask for help.

The garlic bulbs are in, and the beds have been prepared for winter. The students have been making fat seed balls for birds and our resident Robin.






Mr Bouquet, our scarecrow was lovingly restored to full health after having the stuffing knocked out of him and is back on scare duties.

Careers Spotlight: Autumn & Winter Term Highlights from Lucy Drake

Our Careers Programme has gone from strength to strength this year, with students across all year groups benefitting from an exciting mix of talks, workshops, and events designed to broaden horizons and inspire future ambitions.

In September, we welcomed a solicitor, who gave invaluable insights into the **legal** profession. Students also took part in two **virtual STEM sessions**, exploring cutting-edge science and technology, while **Barclays** delivered a practical CV writing workshop. Creativity was at the forefront when a speaker shared her expertise in **marketing**, and medicine came under the spotlight with a representative from **Kent University** discussing pathways into the medical field.

October and November continued the momentum. Year 7 students engaged with another **STEM virtual session**, while Years 9 and 10 were captivated by an in-person assembly from the **Army**, offering a glimpse into careers in the armed forces. Alumni speaker *Ellie* returned to share her journey into HR with Year 10, and an ex-security and prison officer, spoke candidly to Years 7 and 8 about his career experiences and his path to working for Ford. December saw further STEM engagement for Years 7 and 8, and a valuable **college talk from EKC**, guiding Years 10 and 11 through their next steps.

Alongside these sessions, we hosted a hugely successful **Post-16 Evening for Year 11**, where over ten colleges and sixth forms attended to showcase their opportunities. This event gave students and families the chance to explore a wide range of pathways, ask questions directly to providers, and begin shaping their plans for life beyond school.

Looking ahead, our Careers Programme continues to grow. Next term we are excited to welcome **more STEM and humanities speakers**; alongside professionals whose careers connect directly to the subjects our students study. This will give learners the chance to see how classroom knowledge translates into real-world opportunities. We are also preparing for two major events in July: our **Careers Fair**, which will bring together a wide range of employers, colleges, and universities, and the **Year 10 Work Experience programme**, offering students the invaluable chance to step into the workplace and gain first-hand insight into professional life.

Parental Workshops

Our Mental Health Support Team have shared some valuable parent online workshops that you can attend by signing up via the QR codes. This includes *Understanding the Amazing Teenage Brain*, *Eating Disorder Prevention*, *Exam Stress Support* and *Autism & Sleep*.
