#### Dear Parents/Carers

#### **Catering- Portion Uplift Trial**

Following Student Council feedback at Wye and at other UL schools, in which students have said that portion sizes are not sufficient, next term we will be part of a trial across UL schools to increase portion sizes in the main meal. This involves the addition of a half portion of carbohydrates in the main meal and grab and go options, such as an extra half portion of roast potatoes, rice or pasta, the addition of a garlic bread, the addition of a portion of wedges with a panini.

The cost of this portion increase will be 14p, bringing the cost of the hot/cold meal deal (main meal + pudding) to £2.66. Main meals without pudding will rise to £2.34. The additional cost will fund the portion increase, and there will be no profits made from the uplift.

The trial and the uplift in price will be for the duration of the summer term, until we break for the summer holiday. Alongside other UL schools within this trial, we will review whether the portion and price uplift has a positive response from students. We will be seeking feedback from students throughout the trial, but also welcome any feedback from parents/carers.

#### **Equipment and readiness to learn**

It is vital that each student comes to school every day with the basic equipment needed for learning. All students will need a pencil case containing the following items:

- Black and green pens (a multi-pen can be purchased)
- Pencils, pencil sharpener and eraser
- Drywipe pen (mini whiteboard marker)
- Ruler, 30cm

- Glue stick
- Coloured pencils
- Highlighter pens

Mathematics sets and calculators will be needed. Students need a scientific calculator, and we recommend the Casio FX83GT-CW. Mathematics sets will need to include a protractor and compasses. Pencil cases and calculators should be clearly marked with your child's name.

With the exception of calculators, we set all of the above at cost price at Reception for students to purchase before school and at break/lunch. Items most commonly missing are drywipe pens and glue sticks.

At the start of the year the school purchased mini whiteboards for every student to be able to use in every classroom, but we asked that students provide their own pens. Mini whiteboards are used routinely by staff, as a quick and effective way to check every student's understanding of what has been taught during the lesson. Without all of the above equipment, your child will not be able to engage fully in lessons as staff do not have equipment to be able to lend.

Please take the opportunity over the two week break to check your child's pencil case has everything they need and replenish what they do not have.

#### Spotlight on Speech and Language

#### **Understanding Lisps – A guide for Parents**

At Wye school, we are committed to supporting the needs of all our students, including those with speech and language challenges. One common issue some children face is a lisp, which can affect their ability to pronounce certain sounds, particularly "s" and "z" sounds. Understanding and addressing this issue early can significantly impact a child's communication skills and confidence.

#### What is a Lisp?

A lisp is a speech impediment where a child has difficulty producing the correct sounds for "s" and "z." There are different types of lisps, including:

Frontal Lisp: The tongue pushes too far forward, creating a "th" sound instead of "s" or "z." And Lateral Lisp: Air escapes over the sides of the tongue, making the sound wet or slushy.

## **Royal Opera House Visit**



On Tuesday 1st April, a group of our students were very excited to visit the Royal Opera House for a fantastic immersive concert, *Everybody Sing The Magic Flute.* 

The concert was a special event to launch United Learning's collaboration with the Royal Opera House on a new project based on Mozart's opera *The Magic Flute*.

As part of the project, students across the Group have been working with artists from the Royal Opera House to create a unique performance of the famous opera.

With the aim of promoting students' creativity, confidence and collaboration skills, the project has so far seen students learn six songs from *The Magic Flute* to perform at the launch event. Bringing together 1,700 students from 53 schools, students created a vibrant performance of the opera alongside the Royal Ballet & Opera Orchestra and professional opera singers.

During the Summer Term, students will then learn the rest of the repertoire to perform at one of three concerts across the country in June and July. These will be held at the Royal Festival Hall in London, Bridgewater Hall in Manchester and Corn Exchange in Cambridge. Eight students from Wye School across Years 7, 8 and 9 took part in this event.

The concert was a wonderful way to launch the project, and our students are now very much looking forward to performing at the Royal Festival Hall in the summer.


#### **Congratulations to Our Top Science Homework Achievers!**

#### SportsLab visit



A Level and GCSE PE and Food Students were invited to experience a morning as a sport scientist at Canterbury Christ Church University. They had a session on diet and performance where they explored the dietary needs of an athlete and considered the components of diet. They then enjoyed a session in the laboratories with students experiencing what it was like to measure and analyse their VO2 max and observing one student on the treadmill. We measured two students' power on the bikes, comparing size and age. We then looked at the BMI pod and were shown how it was used to measure Body Mass Index. This state-of-the-art equipment is regularly used by professional athletes and teams.

#### Conclusion

You will know that we are moving from being an 11-18 to 11-16 school with the phased closure of our 6<sup>th</sup> form starting next year and closing completely in August 2026. The school was built for 600 students, which originally was to be 3 forms in Years 7-11 and then 6<sup>th</sup> Form. Now that we will no longer have a 6<sup>th</sup> form, we are moving to 4 form entry in Years 7-11, keeping the overall size of the school at 600. You will know that due to the small size of our 6<sup>th</sup> Form we have already had 4 form entry in occasional years, depending on the local need, with our current Year 7 and Year 8 being 4 form entries. As an oversubscribed school this will carry on each year going forward allowing us to

reduce our waiting lists and offer a place to more of the people who put us as their first choice school locally. It will have no impact on resourcing or use of space as the 4<sup>th</sup> form will use space being freed up by the closure of the 6<sup>th</sup> form.

The roadworks issue has been an interesting one this term, at one point I think there was only one road left from Wye to anywhere that did not have roadworks or indeed was shut completely! Thank you for your patience with the impact this had on school buses, the school run, trips, and other things. We will do everything we can to minimise the impact of this next term. On that note, sadly, there is another planned closure, on Olantigh Road this time, which we think and hope is not blocking the school from the village side but is blocking us from the other side, here is the information:

**UK Power Networks works**. To allow installation works to be carried out, Kent County Council has made an Order to temporarily prohibit through traffic on part of Olantigh Road, Wye. A closure is planned from 7th April 2025, with estimated completion by 9th May 2025, or where stated on a valid Permit (KZ50032496758-02 - UK Power Networks). The scheduled dates may vary for these works with appropriate signage displayed on site and the works will be displayed on One. Network Olantigh Road will be closed from Olantigh Farm, to the junction with Occupation Road, to the extent indicated by signs and barriers on site. The closure is required for the safety of the public and workforce while installation works are undertaken by UK Power Networks. The alternative route for any through traffic is via Olantigh Road, Scotton Street, Coldharbour Lane, Waltham Road, Woods Hill, Richdore Road, Sole Street, Thornham Lodge, Ripple Farm, Olantigh Road and vice versa. Pedestrian access will be maintained during the works.'

I hope you all have a good Easter holiday and look forward to seeing all the students back for term 5.
